
During this year of Jubilee I was fortunate

Towel & Basin in the 21st Century

2001 is just around the corner and several new and challenging projects are on the landscape for Towel & Basin. David Best will be co-authoring a book on "whole life stewardship". Release date to be announced. Highley Music will be releasing an all new Mountain Glory CD. Details about this commemorative recording are found in the article on page 3 of this newsletter. In addition to these projects, David Best will devote time this year to the formation of a new ministry focus for musicians and artists. This new effort will challenge, train, and deploy musicians and artists for specially selected mission projects world wide.

Kosovar Refugee Relief and Recovery

The images captured the western world's attention...thousands of people trudging on foot, old men and women, young mothers with children—violently forced to flee from their homes and country. Towel & Basin was asked to lead an assessment team to evaluate and assist the Church of the Nazarene relief effort to the Kosovars who had fled to Albania.

In addition to conducting the assessment and helping the Albanian Nazarenes develop a multi-tiered response, Towel & Basin with its partners raised over \$5,000 in funds for the relief effort which was passed on directly to Nazarene Compassionate Ministries International that funded relief services in Albania and recovery programs in Kosovo.

While making his second trip to Albania, David Best notes he remembered Joseph's words to his brothers. "You meant it for evil, but God meant it for good." Truly, the tragedy of the Kosovars afforded people opportunity to

respond in compassion and become aware of refugees worldwide. Still today, somewhere in the world there are over 50 million people who've been forced from their homes and are either

As Kosovars began returning to their homeland, they immediately invited organizations like Nazarene Compassionate Ministries International to minister in Kosovo. Today, for example, NCM is assisting the Kosovars with rebuilding houses, facilitating Bible studies and support groups and developing leaders for new churches that have begun.

Mission to India

In the past seven years, David Best has conducted three missions to India. These missions have included teaching on compassionate ministries, church planting, providing technical and logistical assistance for an airlift of medicines by Heart to Heart International, preaching revivals, and teaching urban ministries courses.

In these activities, Towel & Basin has

demonstrated its motto of "serving so that others may serve." This approach seeks to avoid the paternalism inherent in some mission efforts and ensures a greater possibility for indigenous leaders to become self-determining, their organizations self-sustaining. Further, the effectiveness of Towel & Basin's methodology is evident in a phenomenal ROI (return on investment) that results in a multiplication of ministry. For example, through these three missions to India, hundreds of national leaders have been equipped and resourced. These

Mission to The Middle East

Last September David visited the ruins of the ancient city on the Mediterranean Sea known as Byblos, (in Greek, *papyrus*) because it was a commercial center for the papyrus trade. Scribes here developed an alphabetic phonetic script that is the

precursor of our modern alphabet.

While in the Middle East (also called Near East or Eastern Mediterranean), David facilitated stewardship seminars for pastors and lay leaders in Amman, Beirut, Lebanon, and Jerusalem. David also presented a mini-concert at

Highley Music to Release Commemorative CD

On Resurrection Day, Greg Morse, David Best, Michael Pitts, and Dana Walling met at Dana's home in

San Diego California for Easter dinner. The afternoon was spent singing together—something they had been doing for over 29 years as Mountain Glory, a pioneer group in contemporary Christian music.

The following day, Mountain Glory went into Greg Morse's recording studio in Orange, CA. It was the first time the entire group had recorded in over 25 years. It also would be the final time the four original members would sing together—at least this side of Jordan. Just five

weeks later, bass player and soul brother Dana Walling died after an 18 month battle with brain cancer.

Towel & Basin will release the fruit of those last sessions on a commemorative CD in early 2001. Part of the proceeds of this CD will go to the Dana Walling Memorial Scholarship fund established by his family at Point Loma Nazarene University.

Here is the Chorus of the song Dana requested Mountain Glory sing at his memorial service:

I'm at home in Jesus; I'm at home in the Lord.

I'm at home can't you see in the one who set me free;

In Jesus the Lord, I'm at home.

Disaster Response Manual Developed

As a result of its work with the crisis in Kosovo and Albania, Towel & Basin was invited by Nazarene Compassionate Ministries International to expand on that service and develop a manual for Nazarenes responding to disasters in world areas. This comprehensive handbook should be completed early next year.

Work has been ongoing for months

and included interviewing disaster response professionals, researching current literature, developing diagnostic instruments and vetting of manual drafts by NCM regional coordinators in the world areas. The final product will include protocols for NCM leadership in disaster preparedness as

well as specific, practical tools for assessing disasters and designing responses by NCM field staff. After publication, the goal is that the manual will serve as a core text for a training program to build capacity for effective disaster response.

the cause. Cash and gifts-in-kind were raised. Coupled with generous donations of time by contractors, skilled labor and other volunteers, a house was renovated and restored. Johnnie Mae and her grandchildren moved out of the housing project and into a comfortable home! It was a new beginning for a family that needed a helping hand.
